Did you know?

- As you approach the entrance to the U.S. Supreme Court building you can see near the top of the building a row of sculptured figures picturing the world's great lawgivers. Each figure is facing the one in the middle, who is facing forward with a full frontal view. The central figure is Moses, and he is holding the Ten Commandments.

- As you enter the courtroom in the Supreme Court building, the two large oak doors have the Ten Commandments engraved on the lower portion of each door.

Did you know?

- When seated in the courtroom, you can see on the wall above the area where the Supreme Court judges sit, a display of the Ten Commandments.

Did you know?

- Bible verses are etched in stone all over federal buildings and monuments in Washington, D.C.

Did you know?

- James Madison, our fourth president, known as “the father of our Constitution,” made the following statement:

“We have staked the whole of all our political institutions upon the capacity of mankind for self-government, to control ourselves, to sustain ourselves according to the Ten Commandments of God.”

Did you know?

- Patrick Henry, patriot and Founding Father of our country, said:

“It cannot be emphasized too strongly or too often that this great nation was founded not by religionists but by Christians, not on religions but on the Gospel of Jesus Christ.”

Did you know?

- Every session of Congress begins with a prayer by a paid preacher, whose salary has been paid by the taxpayer since 1777.

Did you know?

- Fifty-two of the 55 founders of the Constitution were members of established orthodox Christian churches in the colonies.

- Thomas Jefferson worried that the Courts would overstep their authority, and instead of interpreting the law would begin making law an oligarchy, the rule of the few over the many.

- The first Supreme Court Justice, John Jay, advised:

“Americans should select and prefer Christians as their rulers.”
