

Introduction

On December 12, we celebrate the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. The Virgin Mary appeared to St. Juan Diego several times in 1531, and came to be known as Our Lady of Guadalupe. Her feast day was established in 1754 by Pope Benedict XIV. In his Apostolic Exhortation *Ecclesia in America* (1999), Pope John Paul II called her the "Patroness of the Americas" and "Star of the First and New Evangelization."

Contemplate the following text on the miraculous power of the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe written by Fr. John Samaha, SM.

"...Our Lady of Guadalupe, a life-sized portrayal of the Virgin Mary as she appeared in 1531 on the cactus-cloth tilma, or cape, of St. Juan Diego, an Aztec peasant and devout convert... Almost five centuries later the colors of that portrait have remained as vibrant as if painted this year. The coarse, woven, cactus cloth shows no signs of fading or deterioration, although that type of material seldom lasts twenty years... Each year more than ten million persons venerate the mysterious image of the Virgin of Guadalupe, making this shrine the most popular in the Catholic world after St. Peter's Basilica at Vatican City... Accounts abound of the miraculous events attributed



to the Virgin of Guadalupe. In the early seventeenth century when floods almost destroyed Mexico City, her image escaped unharmed. ..."
